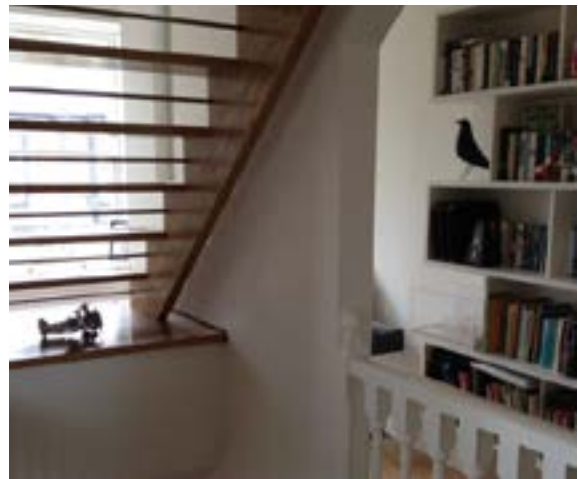
Background and Experience:

Michael is an Associate and senior project architect with over 10 years experience on a wide variety of projects, including new-build, alteration and refurbishment projects. These span the public and private sectors, including residential and commercial.

Much of that experience has involved modern intervention in period buildings in order to find sustainable futures. Mike also has considerable residential experience and has worked in some capacity on the majority of the Practice's residential projects. He also has experience of commercial buildings, having worked on many of the practice's projects for a well known high street bank.

Mike is responsible for the coordination of all technical, contractual and legislative matters and regularly attends seminars and courses on such issues. Recently Mike has completed courses in the CDM 2015 Regulations and a RIBA seminar in Building Conservation.

- Project Architect for the restoration of the Coach Houses at The Haining in Selkirk. The project is Phase 1 of an ambitious project to restore the impressive Grade A Listed estate comprising Haining House and associated buildings. The project received a Commendation in the Conservation/Regeneration category at the Edinburgh Architectural Association Awards, was commended in the Civic Trust Awards and was shortlisted for the RIAS Awards. Phase 2, repair of the stonework to Haining House, is due to commence in 2015.
- Project Architect for the reconstruction of three adjoining 19th century fire-damaged properties in Edinburgh's Shandon colonies. Only the external solid stone walls had survived, therefore the properties were essentially rebuilt within the remaining shell, to replicate the existing layout and details.
- Project Architect for the reinstatement of three Victorian Townhouses in Edinburgh's New Town (previously converted into a hotel) into three separate blocks of private apartments, including reconstructing a central staircase that had been removed to form a liftwell. The project involved repairs to the existing stonework, formation of rear extensions and complete internal refurbishment.

- Project Architect for alterations to Glasite House for SHBT.
- Project Architect for alterations to rural cottages in East Lothian for a private Client.
- Project Architect for housing on Duke Street, Glasgow for Loretto Housing Association.
- Project Architect for new build housing at Granton Road, Edinburgh for Port of Leith Housing Association.
- Team Architect for Scottish Parliament Property Services contract, with involvement in a variety of projects.
- Project Architect for new build housing at Lasswade Road. The scheme comprises a mix of housing types, including flats, 2/3 bedroom houses and amenity accommodation.
- Assistant Architect on the major refurbishment of the Grade B Listed National Library of Scotland at George IV Bridge; a complex project, carefully phased to allow the building to remain in occupation throughout the works.
- Project Architect for conversion of a C Listed building on Shandwick Place in Edinburgh for Places for People. This complex project, which required considerable negotiation with Building Control, was abandoned after tender stage due to legal matters.
- Project Architect for private flats in Bathgate for Balmuir Homes. This project involved lengthy consultation with the Planning Authorities, using a Planning consultant to resolve the issues of a restricted and sloping site. The project is due for completion in 2009.
- Project Architect for new amenity housing at Merchiston Avenue for Dunedin Housing Association. This project, which sits on the canal in Edinburgh, provides specialist accommodation that takes advantage of a constrained site.
